

“Slave to Free”

The Line #4 - Redemption

INTRODUCTION

This week we turn our attention to our redemption. For some of us the circumstances of our redemption represented an obvious release from slavery and bondage to freedom. For others of us, perhaps those who came to faith when they were young, this isn't the way you relate to salvation. But in fact, each of us who come to faith in Christ, has been taken out of slavery and granted freedom. It is an extraordinary gift, and a costly one. In this study we will find what it means for us to be redeemed.

Study Questions (45 MIN)

We are redeemed

Q1. Read Exodus 6:6; Psalm 19:14; 1 Corinthians 6:19-20; Matthew 20:28

Redemption means to gain possession of something in exchange for payment. Although we typically relate redemption with Jesus, the Old Testament also contains references to redemption. In the book of Exodus, what does God promise His people through Moses in Exodus 6:6? Who did David refer to as his redeemer (Psalm 19:14)? Paul told the believers at Corinth that they were bought with a price, and therefore redeemed. What was the price of our redemption?

We are redeemed by

Q2. Read Psalm 49:7-9; 1 Peter 1:18-19; Romans 3:25a; Revelation 5:9

Even when we recognize our need for redemption, some might search for a means other than God to pay the cost. What does Psalm 49 tell us about the price for our lives? What is the only thing of sufficient value to pay that price for us (1 Peter 1:18-19)? How does Romans 3:25a tell us the payment for our redemption is received by us? In Revelation 5 there is a chorus proclaiming the worthiness of the Lamb of God, who purchased us, to receive praise, honor and glory. What are some of the ways you can bring God praise, glory and honor?

We are redeemed from

Q3. Read John 8:34; Romans 6:22-23; Romans 8:23; Philippians 3:20-21

We've seen that the blood of Jesus redeems us. And just as the Israelites were slaves to the Egyptians, we too were slaves. What were we slaves to according to John 8:34? Sin is a cruel taskmaster. What were our wages when we were enslaved by sin (Romans 6:23)? For what thing do you groan inwardly while awaiting the redemption of your body (Romans 8:23)? In what way can we expect our bodies to be changed (Philippians 3:20-21)?

We are redeemed for

Q4 Read Romans Galatians 4:5-7; Romans 6:11-14; Titus 2:14

The good news of our redemption becomes even better when we read Galatians 4:5-7! We weren't redeemed simply to release us from the penalty of sin. God had an even more glorious purpose in mind. Galatians 4:5 tells us we were redeemed "so that" we could receive adoption! Our role has changed from slave to what according to Galatians 4:7? With the freedom we have been granted, we have a choice to make. We can choose who we offer ourselves to. What choices are offered to us (Romans 6:11-14)? Paul describes his attitude toward his service to God as being a living instrument for righteousness. How would you describe your level of zeal for good works (Titus 2:14)? What types of serving are you most passionate about?

Wrap-Up

Praise God we have been redeemed from slavery to freedom! We once were slaves to sin but God paid our ransom with the blood of Jesus, granting us even more than our freedom. He gave us sonship and a choice of whom we serve. We now have the joy of doing the good works of righteousness for our Heavenly Father.
