Introduction

Each November this country celebrates Thanksgiving. It is our privilege to pause and gratefully acknowledge everything that God has blessed us with. Of course, it is easy to be thankful when we are surrounded by our family, enjoying a bountiful meal. But our thankfulness to God must be based on more than our temporary circumstances. The Psalms reveal David's heart of thanksgiving to God, even in his times of deepest trouble. They direct our gaze away from our problems and on to the solution, God, who is always worthy of our thanks and praise.

Study Questions (45 MIN)

Lament to True Thanksgiving Q1. Read Ps 57:1

Perhaps you are most familiar with David's great victories. But when Saul turned out to be an unstable and jealous ruler, David feared for his life and fled to the hills. In verse 1 of Psalm 57, where does David look for his refuge? Even though he was hidden in a cave, he realized it was God, not the cave that provided protection from Saul. Has there been a circumstance in your life that you felt threatened in your finances, health, relationships or something else? What are some of the things we might mistakenly put our trust in during such times? What have you done to find refuge from the storms you've faced?

Q2. Read Ps 57:2-6; Philippians 1:6; James 1:12We find in Ps 57:2 that David recognized God's position of power and that he had a purpose for David's life. How did Paul express this same attitude in Phil 1:6? In the midst of struggles and difficulty it is important to focus on this truth. What the truth about trials is explained in James 1:12? How does this perspective help us to be thankful in the midst of suffering through difficult times?

Who not Why Q3. Read Ps 57:7-9

In verse 7 of Psalm 57 we find David has made a deliberate decision to trust fully in God and focus on Him rather than on his circumstances. In verses 8 and 9 David is talking to himself as he directs his attention off of Saul and back on God. What does he determine to do in these two verses? At no point in this Psalm does David ask "Why me?" or "Why did this have to happen?" Rather he looks to the one who is truly in control. What would you say to yourself, to keep your focus on "who" rather than "why" when things feel out of your control?

Bringing Glory to God Q4. Read Psalm 57:9-11; 1 Corinthians 10:31

Even from the depths of the cave, David is intent on bringing glory to God. How does his vision to glorify God reach beyond an isolated cave to a greater audience? How does 1 Cor 10:31 tell us we can bring glory to God? What is one specific way that you might bring Glory to God this Thanksgiving season?

Wrap-Up

It is not easy to overcome discouraging circumstances and maintain an attitude of true thanksgiving. We may be tempted to: 1) seek refuge in things or people other than God, 2) to question why these things are happening, and 3) to miss the truth that Almighty God is our refuge and will complete the work He began in us. When we focus on God and not our problems, we find cause to be truly thankful and bring glory to Him.

Memory Verse

Psalm 57:1 NLT - 1 For the choir director: A psalm of David, regarding the time he fled from Saul and went into the cave. To be sung to the tune "Do Not Destroy!" Have mercy on me, O God, have mercy! I look to you for protection. I will hide beneath the shadow of your wings until the danger passes by.

Psalm 57:2-6 NLT -2 I cry out to God Most High, to God who will fulfill his purpose for me. 3 He will send help from heaven to rescue me, disgracing those who hound me. Interlude My God will send forth his unfailing love and faithfulness. 4 I am surrounded by fierce lions who greedily devour human prey--whose teeth pierce like spears and arrows, and whose tongues cut like swords. 5 Be exalted, O God, above the highest heavens!
