## "Beyond Failure"

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#### INTRODUCTION

In all of our lives there will be times when we fail to come up to God's standards; times when we sin. Those failures affect our relationship with God. But in His love and grace, God wants to move us beyond our failures to be restored and forgiven. The challenge is in how we respond to our own failures. In this study we will see from David's life both of how we should and *should not* respond when we fail.

## **STUDY QUESTIONS (45 MIN)**

## Q1. Read Acts 13:22; 2 Samuel 12:7-10

God called David a man after his own heart (Acts 13:22). What are some of the successes you associate with David's life? In 2 Samuel 12, Nathan confronts David about his sin with Bathsheba. Up until this point it appears that David had not acknowledged his sin before God. What was his response to Nathan's charge? (2 Samuel 12:13-14) The first step in overcoming our sins is acknowledging them. What are some more common but less productive ways we might respond when confronted by our sins and why would we choose to do so?

# Q2. Read 1 John 1:9; Galatians 6:7; 2 Samuel 12: 13-14; Hebrews 12:6 2 Samuel 12:16

By what means can we have our sins forgiven according to 1 John 1:9? Even when we confess our sins and are forgiven, there will be consequences because of them. Being forgiven of our sins does not eliminate all of their consequences (Galatians 6:7). What was one of the consequences of David's sin (v. 14)? The God-sent consequences of forgiven sin accomplishes three things: it demonstrates the exceeding evil nature of sin, it shows that God does not take sin lightly even when he lays aside his punishment, and it humbles the forgiven sinner. What does God's discipline reveal about his relationship to us? (Hebrews 12:6) So then when we sin, we should not fear God's rejection or the loss of His love, because our identity is not based on our failures, but on our relationship to our heavenly father. How did

David approach God after confessing his sin? Like David, the conviction of our sins should drive us to seek God, it is the condemnation of the enemy that separates us from God.

## Q3. Read John 8:34-36; Psalm 139:23-24

God calls us His children, but we do not always obey Him. What role do we take on when we sin (John 8:34-36)? By addressing our sins through acknowledgement and confession we can be set free. It takes courage to acknowledge our failures, but if we don't it is impossible to move beyond them. Psalm 139:23 asks God to search the psalmists heart and reveal any grievous, wicked or offensive ways. Do you feel you have a trusted friend who you can confess and pray together with?

#### **WRAP-UP**

David certainly was used powerfully by God, but he, like us all, sinned. When he failed to acknowledge and deal with his sins, God sent Nathan to call him back to repentance and forgiveness through confession. But even forgiven sin has consequences. God can use those consequences to teach us the true significance of sin, and to humble us before Him. But God's grace and love is greater than our sin, and when Jesus sets us free, we are free indeed.

## **Memory Verse**

Acts 13:22 ESV - 22 And when he had removed him [Saul], he raised up David to be their king, of whom he testified and said, 'I have found in David the son of Jesse a man after my heart, who will do all my will.'

2 Samuel 12:7-10 NIV - 7 Then Nathan said to David, "You are the man! This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'I anointed you king over Israel, and I delivered you from the hand of Saul. 8 I gave your master's house to you, and your master's wives into your arms. I gave you all Israel and Judah. And if all this had been too little, I would have given you even more. 9 Why did you despise the word of the LORD by doing what is evil in his eyes? You struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword and took his wife to be your own. You killed him with the sword of the Ammonites. 10 Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house, because you despised me and took the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your own.'

1 John 1:9 ESV - 9 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Galatians 6:7 ESV - 7 Do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows, that will he also reap.

2 Samuel 12:13-14 NIV - 13 Then David said to Nathan, "I have sinned against the LORD." Nathan replied, "The LORD has taken away your sin. You are not going to die. 14 But because by doing this you have shown utter contempt for the LORD, the son born to you will die."

Hebrews 12:6 ESV - 6 For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives."

2 Samuel 12:16 ESV - 16 David therefore sought God on behalf of the child. And David fasted and went in and lay all night on the ground.

John 8:34-36 ESV - 34 Jesus answered them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, everyone who practices sin is a slave to sin. 35 The slave does not remain in the house forever; the son remains forever. 36 So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed.
